


A Year in Review

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Letter from CommunityGrows

"All plants need to grow is sun, soil, water and love", a student remarked to one of our educators.

Looking back at 2021, it is clear that it has continued to not only be a time of transitions and challenges, but of incredibly rewarding successes. Like many of you, we recognize the importance of maintaining a sense of community even when we can't meet in person as often as we previously did.

Just as the student remarked that only a few key ingredients are needed for plants to flourish, we also recognize the importance of simple yet strong ingredients for our communities to flourish, such as community building, resilience, etc.

As we grew more knowledgeable about how to navigate life during a pandemic, we shifted our programming and transformed what we had to. This was done in order to accommodate for virtual learning while keeping students connected to the natural world. We were able to do this by continuing to provide garden kits as schools remained remote in the Spring and distributing them to our schools and partners such as the Beacon-Buchanan YMCA, the Ella Hill Hutch Community Center, Mission Graduates for Flynn, Up on Top, and more local organizations.

Most recently, as of late 2021, we have been a part of in person activities, such as the Halloween and Winter Events at the AAACC. It had been a while since we were able to come together in events like these during the past months and seeing this small bit of normalcy return has been amazing to be a part of, reigniting our beautiful sense of community!

We recognize that the sense of community and green spaces the gardens provide is vital for our students, especially when the world around them continues to change in uncertain ways.

"I miss salad day!"

While it was great seeing our students, even if it was remotely, we loved watching the children return to the gardens, witnessing the joy on their faces as they enjoyed a salad made of the ingredients they helped grow in the school gardens. Watching kids harvest from the veggies in the school gardens and using them to make salads reminds us that there's nothing like hands-on learning; seeing something you've grown and cultivated turn into a delicious meal to enjoy in these pockets of green in the city.

In addition, to our garden classes, nine BEETs teens graduated from our 2020-2021 school year program, while six new teens have joined us for the 2021-2022 school year! We are incredibly proud of the BEETs and look forward to seeing them continue to thrive!

This past year has brought on a lot of uncertainty. As the world continues to adapt and evolve to a new normal, so do we. As we transition from distance learning to in-person classes, restructure our organizational and team structures, and begin to partner and host in-person events, we cannot emphasize just how grateful we are for your support, love, and advocacy!


Booker T Recipe Book

During the shift from remote to hybrid classes, we were delighted to welcome the return of our Seed to Mouth cooking classes. Every week, educator Yaya would create healthy and fun recipes that the students could make themselves. Social distancing rules meant that Yaya was teaching from a different room, but was able to live stream the cooking process during which students could follow along in real time. As cooking classes came to an end, Yaya and fellow CG member Abigail worked to compile the recipes into a fun recipe book that students could take home.



Garden Kits

During the first half of the year, we continued making and providing Garden Kits to our program partners. As a supplement to online lessons, CommunityGrows educators worked to create lesson plans and provide supplies for students to be able to follow the projects at home.

We created hundreds of garden kits to help students learn and grow at home and at Community Learning Hubs. Each kit had supplies and instructions (or an accompanying CG video) to complete a science/garden learning activity. Kit themes included activities like 'Mystery Seed Planting,' 'Habitat Build,' 'Terrarium Build,' 'Nature Brushes,' 'Planting Soil Experiment,' and more. We are incredibly grateful to everyone who helped plan, arrange and deliver these kits, and we are proud to say that they received positive feedback from partners and students alike!

Program Highlights

CommunityGrows Coloring Book

As a supplement to our Garden Kits, CG member Abigail designed several coloring pages exclusively for CommunityGrows. While some were related to the Garden Kit lessons and others were more general in their theme, each design incorporated gardening, harvesting, and healthy eating. It has been so heartwarming to receive photos of the filled in coloring pages, showing us that these were a success with our students!



Back to In-person Classes

In the latter half of the year, we were able to return to in person classes. Although there were some modifications to be done to ensure the safety of students and staff, we are happy to see students in person once again. As Cristina notes, teaching in person is "fulfilling... It's good to be there and show them, to see their reactions and the energy from the students... the smiles, the curiosity, the one on one connections..."



Impact of your Contributions

Despite the obstacles that 2021 brought, you helped us get through it all. From supporting us through our Giving Tuesday Campaign, Tote Bag Fundraiser, BEETs Apparel Fundraiser, a \$5 donation or sharing a link with a friend, your contributions have made a huge impact.

One major impact of your donations has been increasing our staff salaries. As the cost of living in the Bay Area continues to rise, it is essential that we pay our staff a reasonable wage in order to recruit and retain a talented team. When we can support our staff financially, our staff can continue to make positive impact on the communities we serve, such as giving kids tools to use in the workforce, teaching them to navigate the world, and helping develop an awareness of the healing benefits of being outside with nature.

Additionally, through our programs, we are able to build communities and help create a generational impact. The kids that we interact with today are the leaders of tomorrow, leaders of communities that have been historically marginalized, and silenced.

We are also incredibly excited to share that in 2021, we were able to hire a new garden and nutrition educator, Oliv Brown! Not only are we thrilled for Oliv to join the CG family, but we are also very happy that her arrival means that we can bring back cooking classes for our students!


In addition to those accomplishments,
CommunityGrows has been able to match San
Francisco's minimum wage for new BEETs (\$16.32)
and \$17.32 an hour for Leadership Crew members.
The Leadership Crew, a multi-level leadership
opportunity, encourages teens to return to the
program and continue building their skills by offering
more money, more responsibility, and additional
learning opportunities.

As we continue to learn and adjust to the way CommunityGrows and our programs operate in this "new normal," we remain deeply committed to collaborating with schools and communities in order to provide gardens and safe spaces for students to learn, be curious, and benefit from the joy and healing of nature-based outdoor education.

The financial realities of COVID-19 have reinforced the need to continue strengthening our financial stability in 2022 by building our 6-month reserve, diversifying our funding streams, and continuing to create both short- and longterm financial strategies to support staff so that youth are able to receive quality programming. In 2021, we were able to bring in more foundation-based funding, as well as unrestricted general operating funds, which have allowed us to meet some of our staff compensation goals (see more below). We want to continue this work into 2022, in addition to connecting with our individual donors and potentially restarting our corporate team building days (covid-19) allowing). We have built a strong culture with a talented and supportive staff here at CommunityGrows and we want to be able to maintain our positive culture with equitable compensation.







Hiring new individuals to support the team and continuing to uplift and retain the current staff are major strategic goals. In 2021, we were able to hire a part-time educator (Oliv), a part-time Operations and Development staff (Abigail), and give small incremental raises to our team. That being said, the Bay Area is an expensive place to live and it is challenging for us to hire and retain our team since we cannot offer competitive salaries (compared to SF rates). In addition, nonprofit staff are often expected to work far beyond their capacity, which affects their own health and wellness, leading to burnout and turnover that reduce our impact in the community. In addition to retaining staff and deepening our partnerships, we will need additional members to fill programmatic and administrative roles. This will allow for long-term sustainability and the growth of our programs. In 2022, we will focus on hiring, training, and supporting a diverse staff (including continuing to bring up staff salaries), and work together to maintain an inclusive and healthy team.

Expenses for 2021



Financials are a key part of our organizational and programmatic health, but sometimes it can be easy to forget that fundraising and grant-writing allow for this work to continue. We love to remember moments like these that happen as a result of advocacy from our supporters: During a class at Rosa Parks, one student said "I love the way dirt feels" and took home a ball of dirt in her pocket to hold. Anna, the garden educator, said she loves moments like these because it is so clear how much being back in the garden has been ground and healing for students after a difficult and disconnected year.
